ADVENT SONG & LIGHTING OF CANDLE

ALL: And with creation we glorify you

READINGS

A reading from Isaiah 64:1-9

O that you would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at your presence as when fire kindles brushwood and the fire causes water to boil to make your name known to your adversaries, so that the nations might tremble at your presence! When you did awesome deeds that we did not expect, you came down, the mountains quaked at your presence. From ages past no one has heard, no ear has perceived, no eye has seen any God besides you, who works for those who wait for him. You meet those who gladly do right, those who remember you in your ways. But you were angry, and we sinned; because you hid yourself we transgressed. We have all become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous deeds are like a filthy cloth. We all fade like a leaf, and our iniquities, like the wind, take us away. There is no one who calls on your name, or attempts to take hold of you; for you have hidden your face from us, and have delivered us into the hand of our iniquity. Yet, O LORD, you are our Father; we are the clay, and you are our potter; we are all the work of your hand. Do not be exceedingly angry, O LORD, and do not remember iniquity for ever.

GOSPEL

The Holy Gospel according to St. Mark 13:24-37 Glory to you O Lord

Now consider, we are all your people.

'But in those days, after that suffering, the sun will be darkened, and the moon will not give its light,
and the stars will be falling from heaven,
and the powers in the heavens will be shaken.
Then they will see "the Son of Man coming in clouds" with great
power and glory. Then he will send out the angels, and gather his
elect from the four winds, from the ends of the earth to the ends of
heaven.

`From the fig tree learn its lesson: as soon as its branch becomes tender and puts forth its leaves, you know that summer is near. So also, when you see these things taking place, you know that he is near, at the very gates. Truly I tell you, this generation will not pass away until all these things have taken place. Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will not pass away.

'But about that day or hour no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father. Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. It is like a man going on a journey, when he leaves home and puts his slaves in charge, each with his work, and commands the doorkeeper to be on the watch. Therefore, keep awake—for you do not know when the master of the house will come, in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or at dawn, or else he may find you asleep when he comes suddenly. And what I say to you I say to all: Keep awake.'

The Gospel of our Lord; **Praise to you, O Christ**MEDITATION

One of the things about Advent is waiting. Waiting
This is a difficult message for our time ... it speaks of patience to people
who live in a high speed, broadband world of cell phones, laptops and
tablets.... Fast food Instant home improvement. All a magazine has to
do to promote sales is to describe an article as something that is fast and

easy ...We are not people who like to wait. Even in this Advent season of waiting.

I am sometimes tempted to read the last chapter of a book before finishing the chapters ahead of it.

In a sense we know how the story of Advent ends. If the four weeks of Advent are 4 chapters in our book. We know that the last chapter – the epilogue -- is Christmas. But, even though we know where this story is going, we wait.

I'd like to tell you a story about two kinds of waiting:

Just imagine you are at the airport. People are waiting for their flight. You notice a man who has dozed off. He is waiting for the plane to arrive but while he is waiting he is bored and so has decided to catch up on a little sleep. He's got plenty of time before his flight and so for now he is sleeping. He is *passively* waiting.

Also waiting for the plane is a little girl. She is excited about the arrival of the plane and flying up above the clouds. She can't sit still and constantly goes to the window gazing up into the sky. She chatters to the other people waiting for the plane, she even asks the sleepy man if he is getting on the plane too. The little girl's waiting is full of expectation,

excitement, waiting on tiptoe. She is anticipating that the plane will arrive at any moment. She is *actively* waiting.

Active waiting Passive waiting

There is another kind of waiting: fear and anxiety waiting – waiting for the other shoe to drop ... apocalyptic doomsday waiting. We know a lot about that kind of waiting these days. All too easy to do that kind of waiting this year! The daily news, the pandemic modelling that tell us how bad things could get if we don't change our ways ... It is so easy right now to get sucked into anxious waiting that wounds our souls.

Jesus does acknowledge this apocalyptic kind of waiting, but then he tempers it with the fig tree. The fig tree which was a normal part of daily life and yearly routine. The fig tree which grew all over Palestine both wild and cultivated. The fig tree that you know and depend on every year. Watch it. Carry on. Be prepared, but carry on.

So what is the best way to wait? I have nothing against someone taking a nap, but passive waiting ... might not serve us well.

And anxiety waiting will probably not help us either.

Active waiting: we heard about it last week: feed the hungry, cloth the naked, visit the sick and imprisoned. Like the fig tree these are needs that

Prayer: God our creator: you are the potter, we are the clay, and you form us in your image. Shape us by Christ's transforming power, that we may live out you compassion and justice, whole and sound in the realm of your peace. Amen.

All: AMEN.

God of power and might, tear open the heavens and come quickly to this weary world. Hear our prayers for everyone in need.

A brief silence.

We pray for the ministry we share in Christ's name. Open our hearts to your call for justice, peace, and healing. Attune us to the needs of the world as you draw near. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**

We pray for this planet in need of restoration: for devastated habitats, polluted waters, thawing ice, blazing fires, swelling floods, and long-lasting droughts. Renew the face of the earth and our relationship to it. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**

We pray for all people who care for others in our community and around the world. Especially we pray for health care workers and care givers. Fill them with compassion and give them the strength and energy to continue their work during stressful times. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**

We pray for people who are in crisis: refugees such as the Iqbal and Alhamad-Wahid families, the homeless, those who are unemployed or underemployed, and those living in poverty and facing food insecurity. We pray also for those who come to our door looking for help with groceries. Relieve their burdens, sustain their bodies, and ease their minds. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**

We pray for the organizations the seek to address those needs: Canadian Lutheran World Relief, The Primate's World Development and Relief Fund, the Saskatoon Foodbank and Learning Centre, CHEP, The Bridge, Salvation Army, and Friendship Inn. Hear us, O God. Support and guide them in their work. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**

We pray for the people in our families and congregation, who live with depression, anxiety, chronic pain, addiction, and other invisible illnesses. We pray especially for Elsie, Orville and Carol, Hannah, Marguerite, Bruce, Gloria, Logan, William, Marcus, Bishop Gomez, Brodie, Karin, Anthony, Robert, Curtis, Linda, Marci, Gayle, Evelyn, Lisa, Danielle, Inger, Anne Jane, Deanna, Ron, Marlene, Martha, for those who feel alone, and all those we name aloud or in the silence of our hearts

(a pause to offer time to name others).

Ease their suffering and support them when they struggle. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**

Here other intercessions may be offered.

We give thanks for the lives and witness of those who died while waiting for justice, peace, or healing, those names we know and those whose names are known only to you. Sustain all who still yearn for the completion of your redeeming work. Hear us, O God.

Your mercy is great.

Draw near to us, O God, and receive our prayers for the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.
