




Color one ripple of water each time you pray, "Lord, have mercy."

#### Who is welcome here?








- Today is the **fifth** Sunday after Pentecost.

# **Rhyming Tree**


Fill this tree's branches will all of the words you can think of that rhyme with tree. Bonus: Can you think of any rhyming words that are two syllables? Three syllables?




