GREETING

As we begin our time of worship we ask that the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with us.

Opening Responsive Litany

We come with our faith and with our doubts; we come with our hopes and with our fears. We come as we are because you have invited us; and you have promised never to turn us away.

CHILDREN'S TIME

When I was very young my Great Aunt May lived with us. She was my caregiver during the day while my mother worked away from home. Aunt May had a rule: no blood, no bandaid. One day I had a desperate need for a bandaid, but no blood. So I substituted some strawberry jam and held out my finger for the bandaid. I can't remember if she feel for it and I can't remember why I needed that Bandaid. Did I have some invisible hurt that needed to be taken care of? Not all hurts or wounds show some are more invisible.

And if it is hard to explain some wounds it is even harder to explain just what healing is. This is a service of prayer for healing, but what does healing mean? Does it mean putting a bandaid on a cut? Or does it mean something more?

- I put that question out to some of the kids in our congregation ... and it was ... is ... a hard question to answer. How do we describe healing? What does it mean?
- One response touched my heart: "My little boy isn't at a stage to communicate very well yet but I do know that mommy kissing his owies makes him feel better and he falls into our arms when he doesn't feel good. His loved ones make him feel better when he doesn't feel good."
- We may not always know what is hurting us. We may not always know what healing we need. But we do know that when God holds us close we feel better.

PRAYER OF THE DAY – Dear God, watch over your all your children – no matter what age they are. And for those who need extra care, hold them close. In Jesus name we pray. Amen.

GOSPEL

The Holy Gospel according to St. Mark 1:29-39

Glory to you O Lord

As soon as they left the synagogue, they entered the house of Simon and Andrew, with James and John. Now Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they told him about her at once. He came and took her by the hand and lifted her up. Then the fever left her, and she began to serve them.

That evening, at sunset, they brought to him all who were sick or possessed with demons. And the whole city was gathered around the door. And he cured many who were sick with various diseases, and cast out many demons; and he would not permit the demons to speak, because they knew him.

PRAYER FOR OTHERS

We pray for those who cry out in physical pain or who suffer silently and who long for the healing that human hands alone cannot offer especially Elsie, Audrey, Orville and Carol, Bruce, Gloria, Anna Marie, Marcus, Brodie, Karin, Anthony, Robert, Curtis, Linda, Marci, Gayle, Evelyn, Lisa, Danielle, Deanna, Ron, Marlene, Mildred, Gordon, and all those we name aloud or in the silence of our hearts(*a pause to offer time to name others*).

May God's hope and healing surround them;

Lord in your mercy; hear our prayer

We pray for those who suffer mental anguish, who worry, feel anxiety, fear the future, who at night cry, "I wish to God it were morning," and in the morning cry, "I wish to God it were night."

Lord in your mercy; hear our prayer

We pray for those who mourn who grieve the loss of love or of a loved one, for those who know within themselves, or see in others a loss of ability or agility ... a loss of choice or independence ... or a dimming of the light.

Lord in your mercy; hear our prayer

We pray for those who are near death or fear death, and for those who have made the last journey from life to greater life.

Lord in your mercy; hear our prayer

We pray for the healing of creation. That air, earth, water and creatures may live in harmony.

Lord in your mercy; hear our prayer

And we pray for communities in which people deal with disaster or terror, hunger or poverty, not knowing how or when their misery will end.

Lord in your mercy; hear our prayer

We remember those who are victimized because of their race, background or history, because of their gender or sexuality, because they are different; and for all who are abused, abandoned or degraded.

Lord in your mercy; hear our prayer

And remembering others in our minds whose deepest needs may be known to God alone, we commend them to the affirming and restoring grace of God.

Lord in your mercy; hear our prayer

Loving Jesus, your hands are strong to hold and heal, to wipe away tears and protect in danger. So hear our prayers. Protect all those who care for our safety and bless all those who continue your holy work of healing: in clinics, hospitals, hospices, in counselling rooms, and around kitchen tables. For those who are working to immunize the world from covid 19. We ask these things for the good of your world and in your strong name. AMEN.
