A reading from 1 Samuel 16:1-13

The Lord said to Samuel, 'How long will you grieve over Saul? I have rejected him from being king over Israel. Fill your horn with oil and set out; I will send you to Jesse the Bethlehemite, for I have provided for myself a king among his sons.' Samuel said, 'How can I go? If Saul hears of it, he will kill me.' And the Lord said, 'Take a heifer with you, and say, "I have come to sacrifice to the Lord." Invite Jesse to the sacrifice, and I will show you what you shall do; and you shall anoint for me the one whom I name to you.' Samuel did what the Lord commanded, and came to Bethlehem. The elders of the city came to meet him trembling, and said, 'Do you come peaceably?' He said, 'Peaceably; I have come to sacrifice to the Lord; sanctify yourselves and come with me to the sacrifice.' And he sanctified Jesse and his sons and invited them to the sacrifice.

When they came, he looked on Eliab and thought, 'Surely the Lord's anointed is now before the Lord.' But the Lord said to Samuel, 'Do not look on his appearance or on the height of his stature, because I have rejected him; for the Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart.' Then Jesse called Abinadab, and made him pass before Samuel. He said, 'Neither has the Lord chosen this one.' Then Jesse made Shammah pass by. And he said, 'Neither has the Lord chosen this one.' Jesse made seven of his sons pass before Samuel, and Samuel said to Jesse, 'The Lord has not chosen any of these.' Samuel said to Jesse, 'Are all your sons here?' And he said, 'There remains yet the youngest, but he is keeping the sheep.' And Samuel said to Jesse, 'Send and bring him; for we will not sit down until he comes here.' He sent and brought him in. Now he was ruddy, and had beautiful eyes, and was handsome. The Lord said, 'Rise and anoint him; for this is the one.' Then Samuel took the horn of oil, and anointed him in the presence of his brothers; and the spirit of the Lord came mightily upon David from that day forward. Samuel then set out and went to Ramah.

Meditation

May Jesus open our eyes and ears so that we might see and hear God's voice. AMEN.

When Christians face challenging situations we look to the scriptures for support and comfort. We look to our sacred story for a way through difficulty and we look for **hope.**

Our Bible story today speaks to all of that. It tells us of troubling times. We hear in that time long ago that God's people were anxious and afraid. They were grieving for the good times that were past. And this sounds very similar to our own time.

Fear and anxiety are a very normal response to life changes like the ones we are facing. My hope is that we will not be immobilized by fear and anxiety, but that these feelings will motivate us to find ways to care more deeply for neighbor, friend, and family.

To care in both practical and safe ways.

Our Bible story today has much to offer our current challenges.

Samuel was encouraged to let go of his grieving for the past and deal with life as it is. That's good advice for us. For the time being: this is our new reality. What do we do with it?

Do you feel like you are a small cog in a much larger wheel? That you have little to offer? I'm not a doctor or a medical researcher, nor am I a front line worker at the grocery store.

David was the least of Jesse's sons and yet he was called in from the pasture to answer God's call to serve. No one expected him to be the one ... that's why he

wasn't there. But God views things differently. God looks beyond outward appearances – though David was good looking – he was not anyone's first choice. But small cogs in the big wheel are recognized and called by God. Small cogs are blessed by God.

We small cogs are called on to look creatively for what we can do - safely do - to care for others.

Our Bible story also speaks of patience. David was young, it would be years before he would be able to fully take on his calling. Patience. May God give us patience ... and calm. And in the calm let us hear God's still small voice guiding us.

These are the things from our Bible story today that speak to our times:

- Fear and anxiety are normal grieving for time past is normal. But if these feelings are overwhelming you, reach out to talk to someone about them.
- Small cogs are important and blessed by God
- Patience this too will pass.

And know that God walks with us through these times. May God guide us all in the time ahead. AMEN.
