A MEMORIAL TRIBUTE TO ARCHBISHOP MICHAEL PEERS

As I write this, tomorrow (August 24th) will be the funeral for the late Archbishop of the Anglican Church of Canada, my longtime friend, Michael Peers, born July 31, 1934, died July 27, 2023. I always knew he and I were both born in 1934, but now I know he was about 3 months older than I.

I first met Michael in the spring of 1971 - it was in the sacristy of St. Bede's Anglican Church in Winnipeg. Our Lutheran congregation named St. Stephen's, had sold their building and moved into St. Bede - the Anglicans had 2 services sandwiched around the Lutheran one at which I was to preach. So, I was introduced to him that morning as we put on/off vestments in the sacristy. A few years later, Michael was called to be the Dean of the Anglican Cathedral in Regina, one city block east of Central Lutheran Church where I was pastor. It was the first fall gathering of clergy that formed a sort of study group that met weekly at the downtown Presbyterian church. The new Anglican (Michael) was there and was introduced (I confess I didn't remember him!) and later in the meeting when I said I wouldn't be there the next week as I would be at our Synod's Pastors Conference, to which (to my surprise) Michael said: at Luther Village I suppose! How did you know that? I asked! Then he confessed we had met previously (as noted above) but that he had seen/heard me speak as president of the Regina General Ministerial when the Anglican Church of Canada had its General Synod in Regina -and added, he had the advantage of seeing me and remembering meeting me (but I not seeing him at that time). I was impressed! Thus began my long and fruitful connection with Archbishop Peers.

I'll try not to bore you with 'all my possible stories'--but given Augustana is 'where Anglicans and Lutherans worship together' (as we say most if not all Sundays)--my connections to Michael Peers might be of interest to some if not all who read this tribute. His obituary in the Globe & Mail mentioned among his academic accomplishments a diploma from the University of Heidelberg (Germany) in Translation! -- I can attest to his linguistic ability. I sat next to him at a meeting and could not figure out what he was writing (or doodling) during the lecture; curiosity drove me to ask him during the break; his answer was he was 'taking notes in Russian using old German script' -- wow! I thought - that's amazing. Yet he was a very humble person; I asked him to substitute for me one night as the lecturer in the Book of Daniel (at the Regina Lay School of Theology) - he declined (not because he was too busy or had other obligations) but because as he said: 'I don't know as much about the Old Testament as you do, Ken' -- Maybe it was the last time I saw him. He told me, in his retirement he wanted to learn Japanese! Don't know if he did, but to think he might try was enough to convince me his quest of languages seemingly had no end!

Together with other downtown clergy, we formed an ecumenical organization, the Regina City Centre Interfaith Association (RCCIFA) - each of the five congregations had two representatives, only one of whom could be clergy. Thus, the ten of us as we met frequently got to know each other quite well. (*continued on page 8*)

Of course, we did many things together including pulpit exchanges, and the other clergy frequently spoke at the daily Lenten and Advent services that we held at our Lutheran church. After Michael was elected Bishop of that diocese a problem arose; the lay person on that committee had a divorced daughter who wanted to be remarried. The father asked the Bishop how this could be arranged; Michael said: Ask Ken Peterson to do the wedding! He can do it for Lutherans don't have some of the same rules we have as Anglicans, and "I know he'll do a good job!" Thus, I officiated at a lovely backyard garden wedding just prior to our moving to Saskatoon.

His being elected Bishop requires a bit of a story too. That weekly study group mentioned above had by that time (due to clergy moving or dropping out from the group) was down to four of us: Michael and myself plus the pastor of First Baptist and a lay Baptist who was the professor of Psychology at Luther College. We no longer could meet at the Presbyterian church; Michael said it is best if we meet weekly at the Anglican Cathedral (as he had a Morning Prayer that day as well). The day that the diocese was to meet at the Cathedral to elect a new Bishop, the Baptist pastor asked innocently how do you go about electing a Bishop. Michael gave, as I recall, a very thorough 'arms length' explanation of the process (and as I said to him later) - how he could do that knowing 'darn well' he would probably be elected Bishop that afternoon - was beyond me! I hung around downtown all day until I ran into a man wearing a delegate's name tag, and being asked, told me Michael had been elected; I immediately went to the Cathedral and thus was the first 'outsider' to offer him congratulations! The 3 of us who had been there that morning, with our wives, then took Michael and his wife, Dorothy, out for dinner at a restaurant a week or so later.

Once I became the Bible Society District Secretary for Saskatchewan, I was privileged to attend that diocese's conventions, always warmly received by the Bishop (Michael) and once that pattern was established, that practice continued as long as I was in that position. When he was elected the Archbishop of Canada, although we were in Saskatoon by then, the 2 of us were invited to an event in Regina honouring him and his wife. Time and space prohibit my going into more details about that. But, given the fact Michael in that role as Archbishop of Canada attended our ELCIC national conventions, and my being at a number of those as a delegate or as a member of a Board or simply representing the Bible Society, he and I saw each other at least every other year. Happily, once in Toronto, he and Dorothy became friends with a clergy friend (from Saskatchewan days) and his wife, so once when I was in Toronto that couple and I had supper with Michael and Dorothy in their home.

I wanted in this tribute to emphasize the role that Michael Peers played in the growing close relationship (now an official one) of the Anglican Church and the now Evangelical Lutheran Church in Canada (ELCIC). I've told you about St. Stephen/St. Bede, Winnipeg, now for over 50 years together, eventually a legal entity I believe. It was at the ELCIC Convention held at the same time as the Anglican Convention where the final vote on making it official that our two churches were in communion (Waterloo and Kitchener was where the 2 conventions were held) - assuming the votes would be positive, a common celebrative banquet as well as closing service were planned. My luck was that I was a delegate to that convention. At the banquet, during the pre-dinner drinks and conversation time, I happened to walk past our Bishop (Telmor Sartison) and Michael in conversation. To my shock, I heard my name!!! Michael was speaking and telling Telmor of how his sense of oneness with Lutherans had developed and he spoke of me, of my role in his growing an understanding and appreciation of Lutherans!!! Too bad I didn't have a recording device, eh?

We've kept in touch up to the Christmas of 2021 with Michael and Dorothy. It was then she said this will be the last Christmas letter. That Michael's health was failing, etc. I have been expecting that one day I would read his obituary in the Globe & Mail, as I did on August 5 this year. Hopefully I have not bored you with what I have written, these personal reminiscences of my friend and colleague of some 50 years, and given you a sense of how Michael Peers and his influence might have something to do with the fact that Augustana is a church where Anglicans and Lutherans work and worship together!

Well done, good and faithful servant! Rest in peace+++ Ken Peterson

volunteer basis, no one is expected to bring anything unless they wish to do so.


It will begin on Tuesday, October 10 and continue for 10 weeks until December 12.

FOREVER IN MOTION

The Forever in Motion (FIM) group will return to its twice a week schedule (Tuesday and Thursday) on Tuesday, September 12th. Our thanks to Shelley Appolonia and Elaine Crocker for assisting in leadership of these classes this year.

What is the Forever in Motion program? The Saskatchewan Health Authority began this program in order to help older adults become physically active through volunteer-led physical activity groups.

Why should we be concerned about physical activity? National Council of Aging gives the following reasons:

Regular exercise can prevent bone loss;

Exercise relieves pain and stiffness caused by osteoarthritis;

Exercise improves balance, coordination, and mobility;

Strong muscles reduce your risk of falling;

Some recent studies have indicated that exercise may also be beneficial for our cognitive health.

According to John Hopkins Medicine, "Exercises that maintain muscle strength, endurance and balance can lower your risk for the slips, trips and tumbles that break bones." And we are all well aware of the severe consequences of hip fractures in the elderly population.

While the effectiveness of exercise on cognitive health is still inconclusive, the benefits for our physical health should be enough to encourage us to "get moving." If you're not convinced about the physical benefit of the FIM sessions, join us for the social aspect!




