Family ties


We have inherited many things from our relatives. You may have the same name as one of your relatives. Sometimes our inheritance can be seen.




- Today is a church festival called **All Saints Sunday**.

Sometimes on All Saints Sunday, churches light candles to remember and honor saints. How many candles do you see in worship? How many candles do you see on this page? Color them in!










Find the book of Matthew in your Bible. Turn to chapter 5. Then read verses 3 through 10. These verses tell us something about who saints are. Do you know who said these words?
